Qualitative Research in Mental Health: Rising to a Global Challenge

“Globally, it is estimated, that only 7% of health budgets are allocated to address mental health difficulties. Most investment is focused on long-term institutional care and psychiatric hospitals, resulting in a near total policy failure to promote mental health holistically for all. (...) Public policies continue to neglect the importance of the preconditions of poor mental health, such as violence, disempowerment, social exclusion and isolation and the breakdown of communities, systemic socioeconomic disadvantage and harmful conditions at work and in schools.(...) For any mental health system to be compliant with the right to health, the bio-medical and psychosocial models and interventions must be appropriately balanced, avoiding the arbitrary assumption that biomedical interventions are more effective.”

September 2018 will see the seventh Qualitative Research on Mental Health conference, QRMH7. These biennial conferences have grown from a modest beginning some fourteen years ago. They have developed in response to wide acknowledgement that a fuller understanding of mental health difficulties, their origins and their treatment entails a comprehensive range of epistemologies and research methodologies. Qualitative methods offer essential insight into highly relevant phenomena such as relationship, power, and social exclusion, which other approaches are hardly able to deliver. The QRMH conferences are a multidisciplinary, international forum in which research that can address such questions is highlighted, shared and scrutinised.

The 1st and 2nd Qualitative Research on Mental Health Conferences were held in Tampere, Finland, in 2006 and 2008, the 3rd and 4th in Nottingham, UK, in 2010 and 2012, and the 5th and 6th in Chania, Greece, in 2014 and 2016. Successive events have attracted steadily growing international interest. These have come from a diversity of backgrounds; mental health service users, health and social care professionals, social scientists and health policy makers, and they have created a space for lively and enriching discussions.

Invited Speakers



Prof. Dr. Dainius Pūras

Special Rapporteur of the United Nations Human Rights Council

Prof. Dr. Dainius Pūras is appointed by the United Nations Human Rights Council as Special Rapporteur on the right of everyone to the enjoyment of the highest attainable standard of physical and mental health.

Dr. Pūras is Professor and Head of the Centre for Child Psychiatry and Social Pediatrics at Vilnius University. He teaches at the Faculty of Medicine, Institute of International Relations and Political Science and at the Faculty of Philosophy of Vilnius University, Lithuania. He is also visiting Professor at University of Essex (UK) and a Distinguished Visitor with the O'Neill Institute for National and Global Health Law, Georgetown University (USA). He was the founder of the Lithuanian Society of Families with Children who have Intellectual Disabilities; first President of Lithuanian Psychiatric Association; Chairman of the board of two non-governmental organizations in Lithuania: the Global Initiative on Psychiatry, and the Human Rights Monitoring Institute. He is author of over 60 scientific publications covering issues such as public health, mental health, public health policy, disabilities, and prevention of violence. Prof. Pūras works closely with different stakeholders for the translation of scientific evidence into effective policies and practices through the application of modern human rights and public health approaches.



Prof. Dr. Carla Willig

Professor of Psychology at City University of London

Carla Willig is Professor of Psychology at City, University of London. She has a long-standing interest in qualitative research methods and their usage in psychology. Ever since she chose to use a qualitative research method for her doctoral research in the late 1980s when such approaches were still very much at the fringes within the discipline of psychology, she has engaged with questions about the nature, status and legitimacy of knowledge claims. She

has used a variety of qualitative research methods in her own research, including grounded theory methodology (for her doctoral research in the 1980s), discourse analysis (throughout the 1990s) and more recently phenomenological research methods (2000 onwards). She is currently conducting qualitative metasynthesis research into the experience of living with terminal cancer. She is also exploring dual focus methodology by combining Interpretative Phenomenological Analysis (IPA) with Foucauldian Discourse Analysis (FDA).

Her most recent books include "Qualitative Interpretation and Analysis in Psychology" (2012, McGraw Hill) 'Introducing Qualitative Research in Psychology' (2013, 3rd edition, McGraw Hill/Open University Press), and 'The SAGE Handbook of Qualitative Research in Psychology' (2017, with Wendy Stainton Rogers, London: Sage).



Prof. Dr. Hella von Unger

Professor of Sociology at Ludwig-Maximilians-University, Munich

Hella von Unger is Professor of Sociology with a focus on qualitative methodologies at Ludwig-Maximilians-University Munich. She is a leading expert on qualitative and participatory health research in Germany. Since the 1990s, she has worked on HIV/AIDS, mental health, and health promotion in the context of social marginalization and migration. She also made im-

portant contributions to the development of research ethics in the social sciences. She currently acts as an elected member of the board of the section "qualitative methods of social science research" at the German Sociological Association. She is also the chair of the research ethics board at the faculty of social sciences at Ludwig-Maximilians-University Munich.



Prof. Dr. Laurence J. Kirmayer
Professor and Director Division of Social and Transcultural Psychiatry, McGill University, Montreal

Laurence J. Kirmayer, MD, FRCPC, FCAHS, FRSC is James McGill Professor and Director, Division of Social and Transcultural Psychiatry, Department of Psychiatry, McGill University and Director of the McGill Global Mental Health Program. He is Editor-in-Chief of *Transcultural Psychiatry*, a Senior Investigator at the Lady Davis Institute, and Director of the Culture &

Mental Health Research Unit at the Institute of Community and Family Psychiatry, Jewish General Hospital in Montreal, where he conducts research on culturally responsive mental health services, the mental health of Indigenous peoples, and the anthropology and philosophy of psychiatry. His publications include the edited volumes, *Understanding Trauma: Integrating Biological, Clinical and Cultural Perspectives* (Cambridge University Press, 2007), *Healing Traditions: The Mental Health of Aboriginal Peoples in Canada* (University of British Columbia Press, 2008), and *Re-Visioning Psychiatry: Cultural Phenomenology, Critical Neuroscience, and Global Mental Health* (Cambridge, 2015).

A feature of Berlin, aside from its exuberance, is the way it continuously reinvents itself.

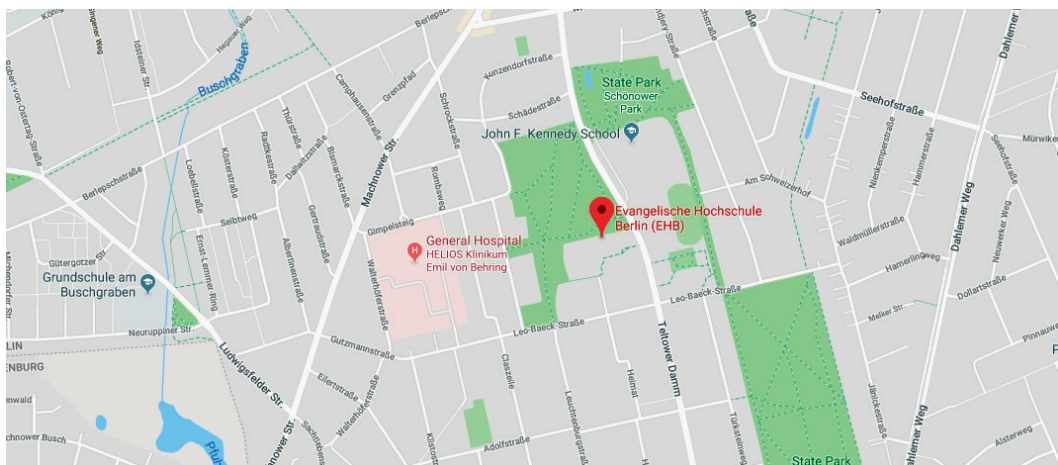

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Presentations | Technical Secretariat

The time allocated for oral presentations is **20 minutes**, consisting of 15 minutes for the presentation and followed by a maximum of 5 minutes for questions and discussion. In order to keep the conference on schedule and accommodate delegates who want to move between sessions, chairs are asked to strictly enforce the time schedule.

Delegates are kindly requested to check the final programme in order to confirm the allocated **time** and **hall** for their presentation, as well as to be informed about the chair and co-chair of their session. They are also advised to make their presence known to one of the chair persons before the session starts and to be present during the entire session in which their presentation is scheduled.

All oral presentations must be pre-loaded onto the conference server prior to your lecture at the **Technical Secretariat** (operating within the Conference Secretariat), the day before each presentation with a USB stick. Presentations scheduled for Thursday should be handed to the Technical Secretariat by 13.00 of the same day. In any other case, presentations should be loaded directly to laptop inside the hall. Personal laptops are not allowed.

Poster Session

Poster presentations are held in the coffee break area (Building E) on Friday, September 21st, from 13:30 to 14:30.

Setup: You may set up your poster any time between Thursday afternoon and Friday morning by 10.30. All posters should be removed during the coffee break on Friday (16.15 - 16.45). The secretariat will be there to assist you.

Size and Shape: All posters are displayed on a floor standing pin board with 2 presentations per side. The poster presentation boards are 1.20 meters WIDE by 1.50 meters HIGH and, allowing for the frame, each presenter will have 0.55 x 1.00-1.20 meters for his or her display.

What to Bring: You should bring the printed content, but you DO NOT need to bring the poster board itself or pins for attaching your poster. The secretariat will supply the poster board and plenty of pins.

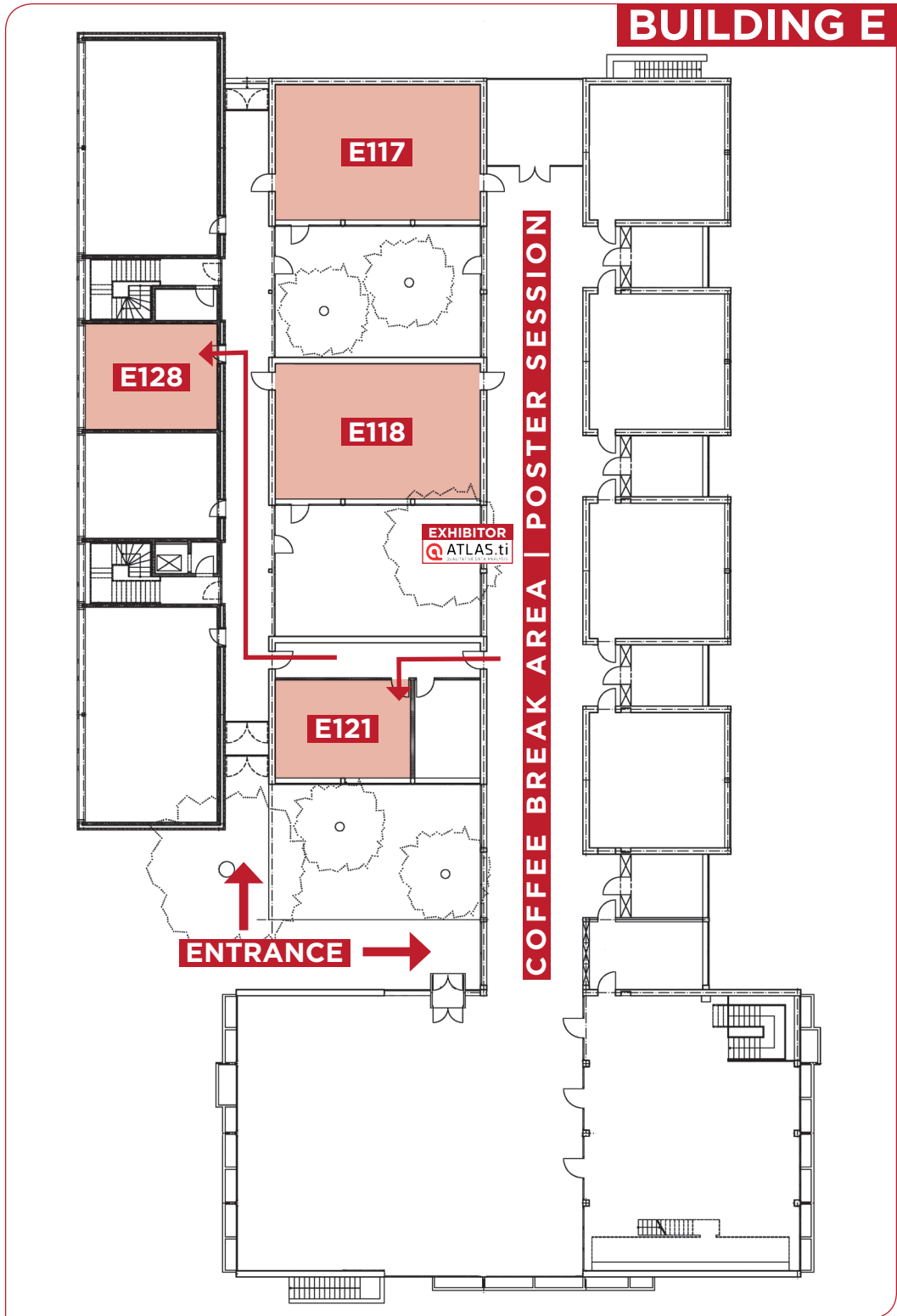
Conference Language

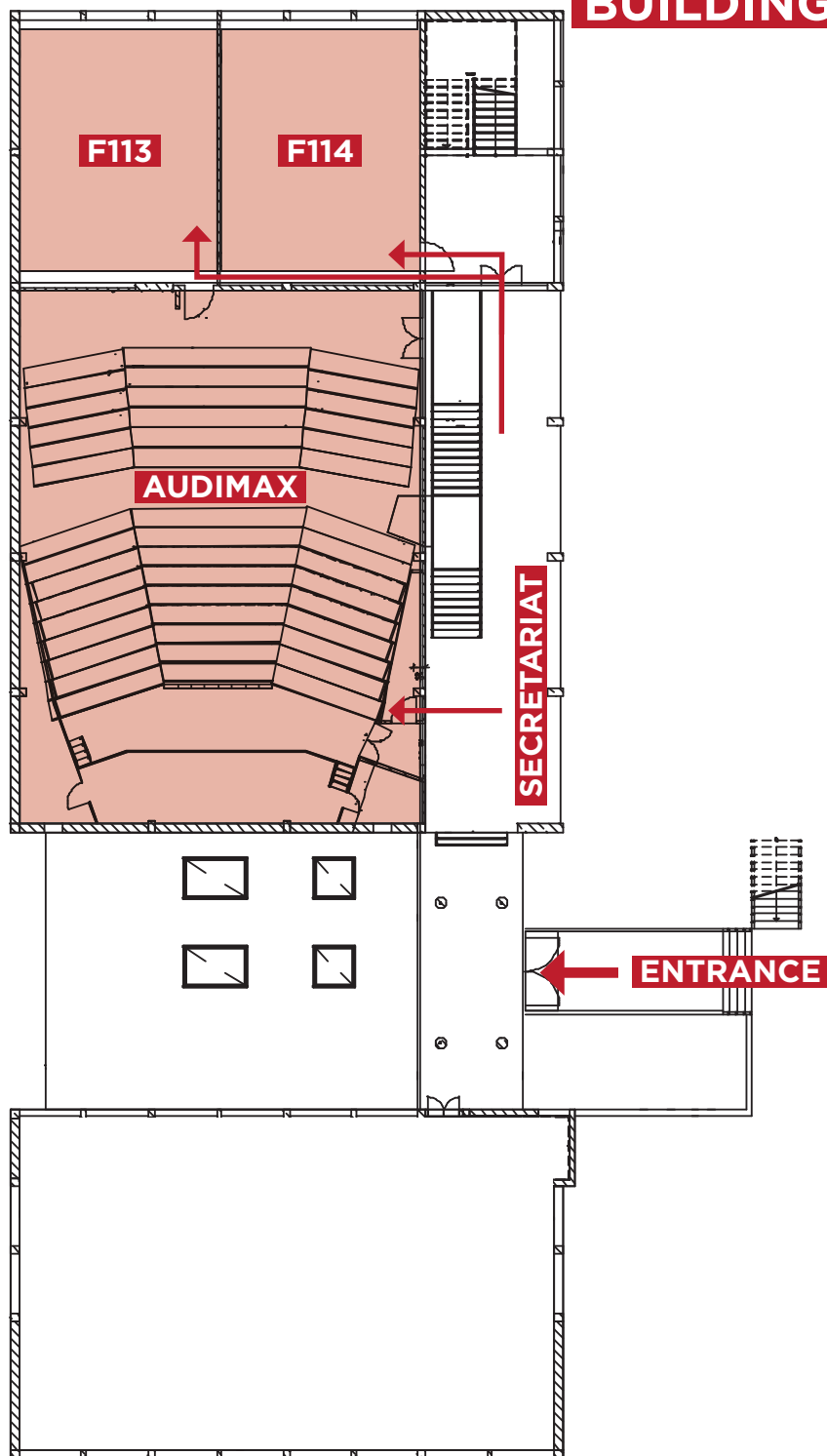
Internet Access

Transportation

The EHB is located 14 km south-west of Berlin city centre, 17 km from Berlin Tegel Airport and 36 km from Berlin Schönefeld Airport.

Transportation from Berlin Tegel Airport to the Conference Venue



BUS: You can get on bus 109 (S+U Zoologischer Garten) and get off at Subway Station Adenauerplatz. Then you can catch the bus X10 (Andréezeile (Berlin)) and get off at Schweizerhofpark (Berlin) station. The venue is about 120m away from the bus station.



TAXI: The taxi ride lasts 30' and costs 35,00€ - 45,00€ depending on traffic.

Transportation from Berlin Schönefeld Airport to the Conference Venue



BUS: You can get on bus RE7 (Dessau, Hauptbahnhof) and get off at Berlin Friedrichstraße station. Then you can catch S1 (S Wannsee Bhf (Berlin)) and get off at Berlin-Zehlendorf station. The venue is about 850m away from the bus station.
